Three years ago, One Voice Mixed Chorus created OVation, an a cappella ensemble that would provide an artistic challenge for OVMC singers wishing to develop their voices and performance skills in an ensemble setting. On With the Show...

five months ago, after we had decided on an OVation concert fundraiser, our biggest question was "what the heck are we going to sing?" We wanted to choose songs that our audiences have responded to best, that have deep meaning, and that we could enjoy revisiting. First on the list was Walk a Mile, with its message of tolerance and empathy. This song has been with OVation since the beginning, and is as close to a signature piece as we have. Everything Possible and We Are, two familiar songs that illustrate personal and community identity, were also easy choices. Wanting to entertain as well as educate, we snapped up some of our trusty toe-tappers: the Manhattan Transfer's Trickle, Trickle (John's favorite group), Lazy River (who needs Louis Armstrong when you've got Shelly?), and Up the Ladder. This is the the first song OVation ever truly choreographed; we own this song just as much as the Turtles or the Nylons ever did. The Cloud is a poem set to gorgeous music that we all fell in love with immediately and sang for a month before learning that a cenotaph is a monument raised to honor someone dead whose remains lay elsewhere. The Turtles standard Happy Together is one that "Mom" loves, and John...does not. Mom is always right... And how relevant is Song of Peace these days? MLK, by the rock group U2, is a tribute to Martin Luther King. Though we performed it once during OVMC's collaboration with the Twin Cities Gospel Choir in January, the song was too haunting not to (and Molly threatened to cry if we didn't) keep it.

Now that we had filled half a concert with music familiar to us and our fans, it was time for the *search for new music*. Jim looked no further than his living room; he had already been working on an arrangement of a Barry Manilow tune from his (and John's, Robin's, Darcy's, and Shelly's) high school days. *All the Time* is just as relevant now as it was for teenagers in the mid-'70s. The first time most of us discovered *Hodja* was following a rehearsal when John insisted we hear the coolest tune off an old Todd Rundgren album he just happened to have lying around. Jim reclaimed his long-lost album and began transcribing it for us. We felt like we needed a couple of standards and added *Dream a Little Dream of Me* and *Moon River* with their tight, silky harmonies. How could we not ask the Mamas, Papas, and Mancini to come along?

Just when we thought we had enough on our plate, Jane approached us with her suggestion for the June OVMC concert, "Blurring the Lines." Written by local composer Jay Huber, Valley of Colors is the second of three songs about Joan of Arc. It was not only a great fit for the upcoming genderblur concert, but challenged our ears and concepts of what we could do as an ensemble. We had the good fortune of working with Jay for an evening, not only polishing the music, but gaining insights into the music. The text, from a time when the content (a woman dressing as a man!) was shocking, is now deliberately restated in a beautiful setting. It reinforces that though taboos have been around for a long time, they can be broken. And then came Paul...we knew that he was composing a new work for this evening, but Flight pushed us even further. Down to the River/Down by the Riverside simply felt like great ways to begin and re-begin our evening together - and you never know when you'll need nondenominational, non-faith-specific spiritual music, right?

We hope we've given you an abundance of music to make you think, help you feel, and keep your toes tapping: OVation at its best.
